There are resources and options available for everyone to help them through the process. Below are resources specifically for youth who are interested in vocational or technical programs to prepare for a profession. ## Choosing the right school

#### Job Corps

Job Corps is a free education and training program providing career skills, high school diploma or GED, and career advising. #### **YouthBuild**

The YouthBuild program targets out-of-school youth ages 16 - 24 and provides an alternative education pathway that encourages at-risk youth to obtain a high school diploma or GED credential and advance toward post-secondary education or employment. YouthBuild participants include youth who have been adjudicated, are aging out of foster care, and are low-income. YouthBuild programs are available at the following Michigan organizations: Community Action Agency (Jackson, MI), Metro Community Development, Inc. (Flint, MI), Northwest Michigan Council of Governments (Traverse City, MI), and SER Metro-Detroit, Jobs for Progress, Inc. (Detroit, MI).
